These Decisions Are Difficult

Your congregational president, Ann Allison, and I just finished attending a meeting of lay and clergy leaders with the Minneapolis Area Synod staff and guests. The meeting was very informational, somewhat disappointing, and so very important.

There were several presenters who talked about how they have responded to this year-long pandemic. I found what Daniel Huff, Assistant Commissioner of the Health Protection Bureau in Minnesota, said most helpful.

The long and short of his message was to keep doing virtual worship and meetings.

- We can see the signs of opening up, but NOT YET.
- We have to continue to be careful and “care-filled” for the sake of one another.
- We have to wait to see what these new variants of the virus will do (there are four known variants in MN at the time of this writing).
- We must wait for so many more of our family and friends to be vaccinated.
- The age range of the virus is shifting to younger adults, teenagers, and kids.
- We need to realize that we may be wearing masks and social distancing throughout this entire calendar year, although we might be able to meet in person sooner.

I know this can be frustrating, and there are smaller things happening that will help us see one another again - hopefully soon.

- The spring weather will help us be able to meet outside again. So maybe we can have drive-in or outdoor worship sometime in May. Still distancing and masking.
- The spring weather may also allow for some outdoor meetings and activities. Still distancing and masking.
- The increase in vaccines will slowly allow for more small-group visiting, inside and outside. Still distancing and masking.

On a personal note: I get my second vaccine on April 10 so will be as safe as I can be on April 24, 2021 - so I will be able to do more visiting. Still distancing and masking.

Time will tell and God will help us along the way, just as God has been with us this entire time.

*My emotional protective gear has worn so thin,
and grief just leaks out everywhere now.*

*I am so afraid that I will never be who I once was.
And I am also afraid that I will be.*

*And yet, when I quiet my anxious thoughts, I start to suspect that
I am now closer to the me you have always known and always loved.
So help me trust that, Lord.*

*As things change, help us be gentle with ourselves and with each other.
We are all wearing newborn skin right now. Amen.*

Even though our day camp will be virtual again this year, registration helps us plan for live events, groups, and materials being sent to homes.





From the desk of Dr. Jen Kilps, Engagement Coordinator

The Loneliness Project has some **EXCITING** plans for this spring and summer.

WHAT IS THE LONELINESS PROJECT?

It is a project for ALL of Bethel, designed by the Mission Council to address the loneliness we all feel in some form or another. We all crave relationships—with God and with each other. Loneliness was a concern of the Mission Council even before the pandemic. There was a growing awareness, internationally, that people were feeling more and more socially isolated. A concern that participation in social media might have the opposite of its intentions. With the onset of COVID-19, these concerns became a reality for most of us.

The Loneliness Project is designed to build, arrange and beautify places outdoors so that our neighbors have places to meet and spend time. Of course, these spaces are for ALL members of Bethel, but the intention is to extend our activities outward so that our surrounding community feels welcomed in.

WHAT WILL THIS LOOK LIKE?

This spring and summer, we will be building a large deck outside our front doors underneath the 'O Land, Land, Land' entrance on 16th Street. This deck will function as a meeting place for activities, a place to hang and chill and a stage for worship and music. It will have benches and tables and chairs as well as other creative features. The Tuesday Guys are designing the deck now. We could have concerts and worship outside, a subsidized coffee truck (10 cent Coffee Wednesdays), a neighborhood pet fashion show, Bible Studies, a gardening class ... all in a place where our neighbors would be welcomed.

We are also planning to landscape around the parking lot, add to our Natural Playground, build more benches and arrange with a local artist for a mural. We will also be installing a series of signs around our grounds highlighting our Creation Care activities: the rain garden, solar garden, community garden, NEW bike station, NEW Natural Playground, the Labyrinth and a map of our property.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

There are ALWAYS ways you can help! This month: Jen needs an administrative volunteer or two to put together some material (office work), the Tuesday Guys will be pulling out the bushes around the parking lot & a couple other things (muscle-y work), we ALWAYS need gardening help (under the direction of the Gardening Ladies who always have a list of tasks), help build two more additions to our Natural Playground, and idea/thinking work! Keep a look out for sign-up emails from Jen, Pastor B & the Office. And always call (or text or email) me if you would like to participate in something!

We have lots to do and those things will be changing, so please get involved and watch out for more activities.

Celebrating Minnesota Musicians & Composers

Minnesota is no doubt the land of Lutherans and lutefisk – the latter not being something we are all as excited about. But did you know that Minnesota is also a state of bustling church music composition and performance as well? I would like to focus on a few of the current prominent musicians in Minnesota who have great ties to the Lutheran church and how their presence has continued to propel ministry into current times and will have an impact for decades to come.

Sing-able, contemporary, liturgical. These are some of the words that come to mind when I think of local composer Marty Haugen. The popular settings of *Now the Feast* and *Celebration* and *Holden Evening Prayer* were composed by Haugen and have become a mainstay in the Lutheran church. He has also contributed to many hymns and other liturgical settings found in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW)* and other hymnals. There is something about his music that makes it enjoyable and easy to follow, lifting the text off the page and bringing it to life. He currently is a composer in residence at *Mayflower Church* in South Minneapolis.


Staying in South Minneapolis and moving only a dozen or so blocks northwest of Bethel sits *Mount Olive Lutheran Church*. For over sixty years this has been the home to two very well-known musicians in the Lutheran organ world. *Paul Manz* served as organist and cantor for nearly 40 years and composed dozens of short chorale preludes for organ as well as a number of well-known choral pieces, including *E'en So*, *Lord Jesus, Quickly Come*. He also served as consultant on the oversized *Schlicker organ* installed at the church during his tenure (this is the same organ builder who built the organ at Bethel just a few years prior and I can't help but think that he would have visited Bethel to listen to what organ builder *Herman Schlicker* had to offer). Currently, *David Cherwien* serves as organist and cantor at *Mount Olive*. He follows the same footsteps as *Manz*, composing many pieces for organ as well as choral pieces. He leads the *National Lutheran Choir* and is very active in leading hymn festivals and choirs around the country. While the origins of hymn festivals are not clear, I can say with confidence that both *Paul Manz* and *David Cherwien* have raised the standard of what such an experience can be and how these festivals can celebrate not only favorite hymns but ones that share a greater story or message related to the church year or current events.

There are so many Lutheran college choirs in the upper Midwest with a handful in Minnesota. Every Advent/Christmas I look forward to watching their grand programs, most of which they start rehearsing for immediately in September when classes begin. The *St. Olaf choir* under the baton of *Anton Armstrong* has been the gold standard of the Lutheran college choir for decades. Having had the opportunity to sing under *Anton* a few times for various festivals and conferences it is clear he always has a deep connection to the music that he is able to pass along to the choir and form an intimate connection to the audience. The one thing I will always take away from *Anton* is a comment he made about how a choir 'blends'. He explained that he didn't like the word since 'blend' to many people meant voices should sound exactly the same. He wanted the choir to be a mosaic of different yet similar sounds that when shaped together and heard from a distance form one picture, one sound, one choir, a mosaic. *Anton* is a director who knows how to connect a choir with its audience, whether in concert or church service.

I only highlighted a few of Minnesota's current Lutheran music giants. We are in a state surrounded by talent and music and I hope that we can celebrate this and be grateful for every note we hear or sing to the glory of God.
