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Our Lutheran Faith and Our Public Voice

How do we respond in times like this? With a national election, global pandemic, racial injustice, and all things publicly challenging here and now, what do we do about these things? Recently, I looked at what our faith has to say about these very questions. I spent some time on the ELCA Social Statement web page, and here is a bit of what I have learned.

"Over time Lutherans have learned that energetic civic engagement is part of their baptismal vocation, both as individuals and through the church's corporate witness. Such civic participation is not simply voluntary, idealistic, or altruistic. The ELCA holds to the biblical idea that God calls God's people to be active citizens and to ensure that everyone benefits from the good of government (Jeremiah 29:7, Romans 13:1-7).

Civic engagement takes many forms. Examples include: • informed and regular voting • participation in government efforts such as the census • attending public meetings • public service as a government employee or in public office • involvement with political parties and campaigns • advocacy about particular issues • volunteering for public-service organizations • community organizing for social change • nonviolent protest."

Use of Building in This Time of Global Pandemic

As per the discussion with the Board of Administrators in September of 2020, <u>Bethel Lutheran Church will take room requests from our members</u>, <u>partners in ministry</u>, <u>as well as our regular renters</u>, and will accommodate these requests as we are able in accordance to CDC guidelines during this continued global pandemic. **Room Reservation forms must be submitted to the office prior to any room being assigned**.

That is, if we are able to accommodate requests by placing them in rooms where social distancing for the number of people expected can be accomplished, these groups will be allowed to use that space. However, **they will also be expected to work with very strict guidelines** regarding the health and safety of their attendees, as well as all people who might be in the building at the same time (i.e. staff of Bethel, NHS, and BNA, other groups). They will be required to take temperatures, keep lists, use hand sanitizers, be masked, and clean their area with appropriate disinfectant upon their departure. (At this point requests have/are expected to come from Scouts BSA, Girl Scouts, Overeaters Anonymous, Continuous Action Alcoholics Anonymous, and Debtors Anonymous.)

Bethel is also taking requests to use our outdoor space for appropriately sized gatherings on our land. At this point, we have requests for Saturday mornings throughout the winter for our Cub Scouts. Members and friends of Bethel are invited to reserve parts of our outdoor space for gatherings. Restrictions and guidelines will also be required at these events.

The Board of Administrators reserves the right to reverse this decision should we find that we are unable to keep people safe within our building. The Board also reserves the right to cancel any room assignment to any organization that does not uphold the rules, regulations, and guidelines in place to keep as many people safe from COVID-19 as possible.

Both Casa congregations continue to utilize worship space on a weekly basis. They are NOT using other rooms, or the kitchen, for other ministries, until further notice.

Finally, the Board of Administrators has also decided that the Bethel congregation will continue to refrain from worshiping within our sanctuary until further notice. (It is the singing that prevents us.) Again, we would rather worship via Drive-In and/or YouTube with everyone, rather than bury anyone who might pick up this virus by worshiping in person with us. We continue to watch the daily infection rates, CDC guidelines, and pray for appropriate answers around our own ministries.

My Life Flows on... in never ending songs

Every week for the past few months Bethel has always had plenty of activities going on. Every Sunday a worship service with fellowship following. Coffee hours and story times, meetings and gatherings over Zoom. The connections that they make are the

basis of a healthy community and congregation. I'm always impressed at the community that this church has fostered. I have had the opportunity to watch and listen to many worship services over the past months. Some have given me good ideas of how to be engaging online while others have solidified the fact of the true challenges that face many smaller congregations in trying to reach out in a digital platform. Where does this all leave music and its role in the digital worship service?

To be quite honest, music has played very different roles in different churches with the start of COVID. Some musicians have had their hours cut or their jobs eliminated altogether, others have gone on with minimal music and taken recordings from past services pre-COVID to use in current worship services, and still others have recordings of their music staff playing from home. There are some who are in person during live recordings playing to an empty room and others like myself making recordings ahead of time to an empty room.

Let me tell you that it has been a challenge to plan worship services online from the music aspect. Every month I get a stack of planning sheets that have spaces to fill in the hymns and music for every Sunday of the coming month. I will read the scripture passages and use online tools to help make decisions about what hymns fit best. Sometimes the text will fit perfectly with the scripture, but the hymn will be unfamiliar, or some eight verses long! In that case if the other hymns that day are familiar, I would consider introducing something less familiar if the text fits really well. Then I want to be conscious of how long the hymn is. When the distractions of home are around us, it is easier to lose attention than if we were all in the same space worshiping together. And I wouldn't want to make any Vikings fan wait a minute more to witness another loss!

Choosing which verses to sing is important as each and every hymn is written and intended to have all verses sung. Many tell a complete story. Take *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*, ELW 504, for example. The first verse speaks of God's power that defends us, the second verse continues with saying that we would be lost without Jesus and not be able to defend ourselves from evil. The third verse is... well, here's the text,

"Though hordes of devils fill the land all threat'ning to devour us, We tremble not, unmoved we stand; they cannot over pow'r us.

Let this world's tyrant rage; in battle we'll engage!

His might is doomed to fail; God's judgment must prevail! One little word subdues him."

It's probably best not to end with this verse. The message is fairly intense and focuses more on the evil that is over-come by the power of Christ Jesus – which is, by the way, summed up in the last verse. It is certainly powerful to try to show as much of the full story the hymn tells as possible without losing online attention. The next time you see that we don't sing all the verses of a hymn for an online worship, know that many times there is more to the story, and a quick search online and especially on the site Hymnary.org is very helpful in finding the rest of a hymn's text if you don't have dozens of hymnals sitting around like I do. I'm just unique like that.

Whether we are parents overwhelmed with kids and decisions about school; or are really, really lonely, waiting for things to be safer; or are extroverts feeling depressed at their lack of what sustains them; or people who can't be with family, no matter how much they miss them... just a few examples.

We need to 'be there' for each other. Especially now, because we all are struggling. But, as Dave pointed out, people who cannot leave their rooms, houses, beds are cut off from what little support they have.

So write. Call. If you need a directory, Susie would be more than happy to email or mail you one. If you don't know who to call, ask Pastor Brenda for some suggestions. Or ask me. Or Phil.

God lives in our relationships with one another. Jesus had friends, not just disciples. He gave love to the people he met, telling us to love especially those who are marginalized by our society. We often don't know what others need unless we ask.

So ask.

Dave surprised me with his depth of compassion. (I shouldn't really be surprised.) I asked him a simple question and feel blessed by his response. We all have so much we can give and share with each other. We may be surprised by the gifts of others.

I pray, fervently, for all of you. For us, as a community. Christ calls us to love one another. It is the most important thing we can do in our entire lives.

Live as a Steward

How are you doing as God's stewards?

A couple of years ago my sister and I came up with the idea of being a conduit (the dictionary says conduit is: 1. a channel for conveying fluids or 2. a tube for electric wires). We are using the concept as some thing or someone that gets a product to where it does some good.

Here's an example. A couple of years ago a favorite waitress at a local restaurant where my sister and her church friends met for breakfast said she had a stash of flannel that she wanted to give away, "do you know of anyone who could use it?" My sister told her that I made receiving blankets for Global Health Ministries. My sister was the conduit to bring me the fabric and I was the conduit of 15 blankets to Global Health Ministries (GHM). And I gave left overs to a friend to make quilts for children.

Another example. A friend at my building brought me five white sheets from a household that was ready to sell the home. My friend knew that I make bandages out of used white sheets for GHM, so she was the conduit to bring me the sheets and I could be the conduit to GHM.

Aren't we all conduits to bring our gifts and offerings to church to have them given to where the needs are? Where are you being a conduit these days?

This time, as she left, we talked. I thanked her again and asked why she came back. Her response was a great example of our "Spoon to Ladle" theme of stewardship. She told me that this was her neighborhood and she really appreciated having this place to help all of our neighbors. She said that when she was here earlier she noticed that there was no canned meat in that section of the Little Free Pantry. "Well, I was going grocery shopping anyway, so I just picked up some extra canned meat so I can share it with my neighbors in need."

This woman knew that she has what she needed to get by in these trying times, she has her own spoon with which she is able to feed herself. AND, she is also "other" focused, using her proverbial ladle to serve others what they need. Our theme challenges each of us to remember that, as we benefit from our ministries, we too are called and sent out to minister and share with others. The ladle is an instrument with which we are able to serve others. Thank God for our neighbor's use of her "ladle" last Tuesday.
