Hello. Friends!

I am so glad to be with you for these few months. I look forward to getting to know you, worshiping together in person or online, and supporting you all and Pastor Brenda in this time of her Sabbath rest and renewal.

I love to drive, and I don't mind a longer commute. The drive to and from the church I served in Shoreview for many years was a gift that gave me time to think, or listen to podcasts and audiobooks, or simply enjoy the quiet of being alone in the car. Even though I



love to drive, I'll admit that when we first moved to Hudson and I would drive home, there was a section of road on I-94 between Woodbury Drive and the St. Croix River that seemed to go on forever. Over time though, the route became so familiar that time would pass quickly. Sometimes I would barely notice the details and I would be surprised to discover that I was already at the river, crossing the bridge into Wisconsin.

When we adopted our daughter from China, we decided that it made more sense for her to go to daycare near church rather than near our home. When I returned to work after family leave, four-year-old Tillie also began commuting from Hudson to Shoreview. The early days were interesting because she was just beginning to learn English, so I had to figure out ways to help her pass the time.

One morning as we crossed the bridge over the St. Croix River, the sun was shining brightly and dancing off the water. It was so beautiful, so I said "Hello, water!" Tillie copied me in her sweet four-year-old voice, "Hello, water!" It was almost a prayer of gratitude. With those two words, an adventure began. We began the adventure of noticing and naming certain markers on our journey. We'd say hello to our neighbors' house: "Hello, Chris and Kristin's house!" "Hello, school bus!" "Hello, hospital!" "Hello, big boats!" "Hello, fire station!" As Tillie's capacity for the English language grew, we noticed and named more things. When we'd say hello to the two horses and a pony by the red barn, Tillie would declare, "They're a family like us!" Yes, honey, they're a family like us.

This adventure of noticing and naming became a holy curiosity for what was happening in the world around us. It was a delight to see things through Tillie's eyes. I gained fresh perspective on what had formerly been a routine drive, often on autopilot.

Psalm 23 is likely the most well-known and probably most beloved of all the psalms. It is often read at funerals, and for good reason. The phrase "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death (23:4, RSV)" was familiar to me, even as a young person. (continues on pg. 2)

Sometimes, though, like on a well-traveled road, familiarity can blind us to the riches of a Bible passage. Either we think it only belongs to a particular occasion or we think we know it and so we stop paying attention to the details.

What if we approach scripture with holy curiosity, with hearts and minds ready to notice and to wonder, or imagining ourselves in the story?

Personally, I love Psalm 23. It is one of my favorites because it is so rich. Yes, it is wonderful and powerful to read at a funeral, but frankly it speaks to me in everyday life too. Hello, green pastures and still waters. Hello, restored soul. Hello, darkest valley. Lord, I fear no evil for you are with me. Hello, table and overflowing cup. Hello, goodness and mercy that pursues me all the days of my life. Lord, I shall dwell in your house with gratitude!

In what part of your life would you like to pay closer attention? How could you approach it with holy curiosity and the adventure of noticing?

How might we approach this sabbatical season with holy curiosity, attentive to the ways God's Spirit is moving in this season?



Stewardship Corner – Jerry Johnson

With my turn to submit a writing for Stewardship Corner, I just started thinking about stewardship and personal loss. I found the blog post below written by Greg Finley. He explains how he became a steward for his own grief over the loss of his brother-in-law Rusty. It gives a perspective I didn't think of.

"A Stewardship of Grief"

Greg wrote this over Christmas time – he really didn't want to write it, let alone finish it, as it could bring people down during what should be a joyous occasion. "What's prompted me to actually finish, however, is the Christian concept of being a steward of one's grief. The idea of being a steward is to watch over or protect or keep undefiled something that belongs to another. It took me some time to fully grasp that my children were a stewardship of mine. They are God's, and it's my job to watch over them, to protect them, teach them, until they are in a sense "given back" to God (not that they were ever out of his sight).

"So to look at grief as a stewardship, I must acknowledge that it has been given to me in some sense. This is hard. We want to think of grief as something random, as something that has just been dropped in our laps, or as something we've just ended up with, not something that may have been delivered by a benevolent God.

"I believe to properly steward my own grief I must accurately give you an account for the hope that is in me (I Peter 3:15). To do so, however, is painful. It requires an honest look at the object(s) of my affections and the object of my faith and how these often take my focus away from where they should be.

"But graciously, the painful look at where I've fallen short takes me by grace back to where the focus must be redirected. Such an assessment causes me to cling to that which is unseen. It helps me to recognize that what is seen is transient—a vapor—but what is unseen is eternal (II Corinthians 4:18).

"This weekend I realized how much I miss my brother-in-law and how I'd really like to understand and explain his life and death. But I don't believe, this side of eternity, that I'll be able to do that. And if I'm honest with myself, I know that doing so is not of lasting significance. Even less significant is the management of my own personal sorrow. What is paramount is extolling the virtues of the One True Creator and Redeemer.

"As I said previously, I thought writing about this might not be appropriate for Christmas. But what I've realized is this is the absolute best time to write about it. In I Timothy 1:15 the Apostle Paul says: 'This saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost.'

"So Jesus, from birth, was on a mission. The story of Christmas cannot be separated from the story of Easter. Because of the curse of all men through Adam, sin entered the world and sin led to death (Romans 5:12). But Jesus Christ came, as a baby, then lived the life that we could not live and died the death that we should have died. This is the gospel, and it is my only hope to make sense out of anything. It is the only way I can steward my grief.

"The gospel is not simply a crutch or spin, but is the message that undergirds everything. And, as author Jerry Bridges once said, it is the only essential message in all of history. I believe this message, although sometimes difficult, is the answer to Rusty's life and death and to my life and death as well. Christ Jesus came to redeem a fallen and broken world." Greg Finley

Greetings, all.

I hope by the time this is published, we are having some nice May weather and done with what feels like an endless winter!

The biggest news from our April meeting is that we are dropping the mask mandate. While this is exciting news for many of you, we need to keep in mind that it is not for everyone. For example, if you have a medical condition that doesn't create a good immune response to vaccines or if you have a loved one with a medical condition, this announcement may cause a sense of dread.
