Roof deposition update

As you saw in our July newsletter, Gene Rodi and Pr Brenda were a part of a deposition regarding who was paying for the roof that was damaged by our solar company. It was a legal dispute between insurance companies, not between Bethel and Novel Energy Solutions. At this point, it appears that Brotherhood Mutual will continue to pursue the other insurance company for most of the money spent on our roof repair. However, Bethel does need to pay Brotherhood Mutual \$12,086.54.

Why? Because Novel Energy offered us this much money under what we understood was a refund of a grant we received together several years ago. Our Board of Administrators did not cash this check for months trying to better understand their intentions. Within the ongoing legal battle, Brotherhood Mutual would like us to pay this amount to them as they continue to pursue the rest of the money (\$155,085.91) from the other insurance company.

The good news is, Bethel has spent very little of this money, and has other money in our roof fund to cover this bill without concern for our annual budget or investments. Being pioneers in the solar industry has been challenging, but things are shaking out well right now.

What was Phil up to last month?

Over the past three years I have served on the board of the Twin Cities American Guild of Organists. The organization promotes the organ, its music and its musicians while sponsoring events throughout the year, ranging from large concerts bringing in guest artists from around the world to small education events and conferences. While my term on the board came to completion last spring, I continue to be active on the education committee and was recently appointed to assisting with publicity and communications for the chapter. The education group hosts yearly Pipe Organ Discovery Days focused on introducing the organ to young people. Bethel played host to one of these just a couple of years ago! Another thing we do is to teach classes about the organ for day camps, schools, and congregations. Last month a colleague and I were able to travel to a small church in Howard Lake, Minnesota, to present the class to both an eager group of music camp kids and to a church congregation that recently purchased a used pipe organ to enlarge and enhance their existing instrument.



Along with a fellow organist, Phil Asgian – yes, two Phils - we packed up teaching supplies which included a small transportable organ. This organ has all the working components of a larger instrument, just on a much smaller scale. With it we were able to teach about the three primary components needed for a pipe organ including keys, wind, and pipes. *I will take a moment to mention that the demonstration organ was built by Dobson organ builders of Lake City, Iowa. The Dobson factory suffered a catastrophic fire that destroyed their entire factory in June. Thankfully there was only one minor injury, but the factory was a complete loss. They are currently in the process of rebuilding with help from organ builders around the country!* We also taught the kids all about the organ, including the difference between the organ and the piano. Check out the video that I put together if you want to learn a little as well <https://youtu.be/H9RCUuRnjq4>. We listened to the demonstration organ and all the various sounds it could make while I played short pieces. It was exciting to have kids be so engaged and eager to learn about the topic.

We were also able to share more about the organ with the congregation of the church. Since they had recently approved purchasing a used organ to expand their own, they were eager to learn more about the process and about how the instrument worked, and possibly why these instruments are so gosh darn expensive and why they even needed a new one. I spoke on how it is easier to sing along with an organ, a wind instrument like the voice, rather than a percussion instrument like a piano, although both have their place. We gave a history lesson about how the organ was first used in Roman times as a battle instrument and finally found its way into the church. Although this took a while given its past, it was a truly invigorating experience to be immersed in the topic that I studied and have so much passion for. It also reminded me to be thankful to the members of Bethel who many years ago decided to place the fabulous Schlicker organ in the sanctuary here – the first of its kind and of growing historical significance in the Cities.

Hello, Bethel Members,

My sister got another cat. It is her family's third. They also care for my mom and dad's dog, Maggie. I asked my sister, Manda, if she is turning into a cat lady and she told me she expects to have 50 by the time she's 85. Manda lives in Florida with her hubby and two teenage girls who are practically perfect. She also works as an administrator in a middle school. Florida school systems started back on the 13th of August. I am writing this on the 20th of August. So in a week, her middle school has already quarantined 32 children and three teachers. She says it is crazy down there, and the tension in her voice betrays the worry she is trying to hide when I ask how the girls are doing in school. My sister deserves to have a fluffy little ball of happiness in her life. So do the girls.

Our neighbors got a beagle puppy. He is 8 weeks old and is the cutest thing I have seen in a long time. They already have Frieda, Pickle's nemesis, really her twin. They have wanted a puppy for a long time and decided their daughter is ready to have the responsibility of feeding and walking the little guy. They've had a long year. Their house caught on fire over a year ago and it is only now just finished, landscaping and all. I think that a little puppy is perfect for their "now."

Last night I watched the movie "My Octopus Teacher" on Netflix. It is about the relationship a filmmaker forges with an octopus who lived in the waters off his beach in South Africa. It won the Oscar for best documentary last year. I highly recommend it. It is delightful and fascinating. The octopus this filmmaker befriends is an ordinary, smallish, octopus. He snorkels and visits her every day, getting to know her and her routines. They form a relationship. She lets him hold her. He observes as she goes about the drama of surviving as a vulnerable cephalopod in a land of sharks. Her intelligence and personality are amazing and her life is not long. But it is a joy to watch this tender story and become absorbed.

I find it amazing how God is present in our lives through nature and, particularly, through animals. They are as different to us as angels. They give us a glimpse of utterly different ways of being in the world. How can we even attempt to imagine what smell and scents mean to a dog, or a lion? Or what it means to live underwater, thinking water was the whole world. Or what it could mean to fly; how different the world must be to a bird or a bee.

We can get so caught up in our own lives, our own troubles, our own way of experiencing the world. So much so, sometimes we can't even imagine what the lives of our neighbors might be like. Fear triggers us to protect ourselves, and often this can mean turning inward, taking care of one's own. We try to respond to our fears of COVID, of loneliness, of financial stress as logically and practically as we can. We do try our best as humans, but we have the tendency to forget that God's creation includes wildly imaginative forms of life. We forget that bats and praying mantises and pandas and manatees are all imbued with God's Holy Spirit, as is all of life.

God's Spirit is with us always and that Spirit is made manifest in the life around us. I am so glad that my sister has a fluffy little kitty to nurture. She could use as much love in her life as she can get. I am so happy the neighbors have the cutest puppy in the world. Their little girl is smitten and that puppy is an automatic love generator. God makes sure that love is all around us. It is our job to make sure we notice. And I sure am happy that Pickle protects Dave and I from all the chipmunks in the world. Where would we be without her?

God's loving Spirit is all around us. "Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them... Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these." Matt 6:26a, 28-29. Make some time to be amazed... to notice the stillness of a lake, to watch the leaves change, to hold a kitten. And give thanks to God!

The following reflects current guidelines for worship as of August 24, 2021.


