Shifting the Paradigm, AGAIN

Continued blessing and prayers to all of you, as well as everyone you love! Lately I have been trying to get my head and heart around the facts that COVID may be here to stay. That is, maybe instead of "waiting for it all to be over," we need to shift our thinking to, "since it is not going to leave us soon, how do we continue to live into this new reality while keeping as many people as safe as possible for as long as possible?" This has been the question I have thought about, daily, since this all began.

It seems to me that over the past 18 months, we have tried many new things, we have failed at some, and we have succeeded on various levels on others. And through it all, we have continued to be "the church." Ministry still happens, mostly outside the building, and in our own homes, but ministry is still happening! We remain the church of the people of Jesus!

And, I know we are tired. We continue to make decisions on a weekly and sometimes daily basis about what is safest for all people, without exception. Although we now worship in person, we continue to be online for many reasons, not the least of which is to keep our most vulnerable safe.

In some ways, the definition of our "most vulnerable" has changed from our elderly folks to our children, yet has stayed the same for any of us with an immunodeficiency. My statement from a year ago still remains important: "I would rather stay distanced from all of you than bury any of you because of this virus."

How then do we move forward with this new paradigm shift?

- Do we just start worshipping together like we used to inside and COVID be damned? Or do we continue to make decisions based on the science, numbers of cases, and vaccine availability, and do our best with the information we have at the time?
- If we do go inside, what can be done safely? Should Holy Communion continue to be in our pews or can we receive the elements up front? Do we hand the offering plates around again, or keep the box near the bulletins?
- Do we worship outside until the snow flies, the vaccines are available to all ages, or COVID-19 no longer exists? Or do we find more ways to come inside and create the safest environment possible?
- Will we frustrate our young families with children (who cannot get vaccinated yet) if we do go inside for worship? Do we frustrate our older population (who are vaccinated) by staying outside for worship? Or both?

What about the prediction I heard just this morning about this winter being a really tough winter again concerning this virus? What if we have to close the building again? If this has become a pandemic of the unvaccinated, how do we make sure the unvaccinated are still welcome - and what about our children?

These are the questions that keep me up at night. These are the questions your elected leaders talk about on a regular basis. These are the questions we pray about and hope to find acceptable and safe answers for each month.

Friends, I am writing this before our Board of Administrators meeting tonight. I have no idea if we will be worshipping inside or outside come Sunday, October 3, 2021. I hope the rest of this newsletter clarifies that for all of us. In the meantime I continue to pray for guidance, for healing, and for a way forward in the midst of this ongoing global pandemic. God help us all.

Ensemble Belonging

Think of all the groups or activities you are a part of on a weekly basis. They can be church related or not. Each group serves its own purpose and has different people participate in it. Some of those groups will even provide a sense of belonging. I feel there are many activities here at Bethel that provide a sense of belonging, but I will focus on how music can provide that and how I have witnessed that in past weeks.

A few weeks ago, Mondays, Masks & Music started up. These rehearsals of bells and singing made a glorious return after an eighteen-month hiatus. During this time, we have laughed, learned new techniques in music making and some have even discovered they have new talents! The overall experience has been very positive even in a different rehearsal setting due to COVID-19 protocols. We are building that ensemble feeling back together again!

What is an ensemble? Dictionaries tend to define a musical ensemble as two or more musicians who play together. It's fairly vague and I tend to agree yet disagree with that definition. While it's true that a musical ensemble is technically made up of a group of musicians, this definition fails to define the deeper meaning of the sense of belonging that goes hand in hand with being part of an ensemble. A music ensemble is sort of like a mosaic. Each person brings their own attributes and colors to the larger group. However, if there's no sense of belonging, that person will not know what to do to fit into the larger picture of the ensemble and would stick out just like piece of a mosaic that is out of place.



How do we create that belonging? Encouraging words, teaching methods that apply broadly to all music makers, amateur or professional, finding time to check in with everyone, and learning something new about our neighbor. The list can go on and on. Each little thing builds us closer together as a tight-knit group, celebrating our similarities and differences, with music being the common thread for all of us. Being part of an ensemble is awesome!

We've had fun each year, even the year it was sleeting and cold. Last year we had a large number of kiddos participate largely due to the participation of kids from Messiah Lutheran (thank you, AnnE Keating)! I won't tell you who won the prize for best decorated vehicle because it was the pastor and she brought her boat!!!!! (The CYF Committee has stipulated that she can't win two years in a row.)

We want the kids in our church and in our neighborhood to know that Bethel cares for them. In this way, we are helping to show them that Jesus cares for them. Yes, by handing out Zots and Snickers bars we are saying to these children, "We people who love Jesus care about you. We want to play with you. We want you to be happy and feel cared for. Because Jesus loves you!"

"It feels awkward to say 'The White Community', right? A reason for this is that whiteness is afforded the acknowledgement that white people are diverse in their cultures, thoughts, and realities. The actions of one white person, or a small group of white people, are not systemically positioned as representative of all white people. So why are we so comfortable saying 'the Black, the Indigenous, the Asian, or the Muslim community'?" - @ancestorsfuture on Twitter.

As White folks, we often do not seek to understand what our role is in anti-racism, equity and inclusion, even in our own workplaces and community spaces. This training will help you understand the Eight White Identities and find your role in the ongoing work of racial and social justice in our communities. All learner types were thought of when planning this training, with times for individual reflection, small group work, and full group sharing. Join us to say no to white saviorism and commit to working toward being an ally and accomplice.

Topics include: Cultural, religious, and racial tensions ❖Moving from indifference to action ❖The eight white identities ❖ White savior complex ❖Interpersonal vs. systemic discrimination

❖Contradictions for white folks in racial justice work ❖Interrupting dominant white culture

Learning Objectives: You will understand the levels of whiteness and identify where you are on your journey. *You will hear stories of both marginalization and hope from Minnesota communities. *You will learn about white saviorism and understand your role in racial and social justice as a white person working toward being an ally and accomplice.

Due to the sensitive nature of this topic, the workshop will not be recorded so that people can be as brave and authentic as possible.

Board of Administrators

The Bethel Board of Administrators, at its monthly meeting on 9/21/2021, made several decisions that impact the life of the congregation.

First, with a combination of faith and confidence that funding will be available, the Engagement Coordinator position, held by Dr. Jen Kilps, will be extended through 2022; current funding is set to expire at the end of this year.

Second, while we continue to recognize the human tragedy caused by the pandemic, we also recognize that some members spiritually need to worship together and doing so outdoors is increasingly impractical. Thus, Sunday worship will be moving indoors. Of course, masking continues to be the norm and the service will continue to be broadcast via YouTube.

Finally, the annual Bazaar with its fun activities like the Cookie Walk must be cancelled this year; the health risks outweigh the rewards. Feelings were torn because the Board also recognizes some members will have a feeling of loss. The Board is in the early stages of planning a spring silent auction; members may want to hold onto some items they might donate, because the silent auction may present another opportunity for donating them.
